


#### 9 Apr - Regular Meeting 2/4

#### Guest Speaker: Jennifer Caldwell, Food Share

Jennifer educated us on the tremendous work of the Ventura County Food Share and the impact it has on hunger. She received many compliments on her talk. Although we provide funds to Food Share and two of their distribution centers we were surprised at the breadth of their effort. About a third of the county residents were served last year. They serve the unhoused, farm workers, seniors and low income families: there is no income requirement for their donation. The slides below speak for themselves.





#### 9 Apr -Regular Meeting 3/4


The photo shows how the meeting always starts with Lions Arti and Joe holding court at the bar.



# Made for the shade

Lions plant trees at Valle Lindo for Arbor Day

Some Lions Club members put their green thumbs to good use by donating 10 trees to the Pleasant Valley Recreation and Park District.

Lions Clubs International is the largest service organization in the world. The Camarillo/Somis Pleasant Valley Lions Club is one of more than 46,000 across 210 countries and territories.

The lion's share of the club's mission is to raise money and donate to various organizations throughout Camarillo and Somis. Whether that be handling parking at the Ventura County Fair, selling food at Moorpark's Underwood Harvest Festival or providing eye exams and eyewear to school children, the club likes to help wherever it can.

In honor of Arbor Day on April 26,

the club's environmental team donated 10 trees and helped plant them at Valle Lindo Park in Camarillo. Planted around the tennis courts where turf work is in progress, the park district hopes the trees will add a bit more beauty, energy and shade for park visitors.

# Meet the American who never flinched in the fight for independence, Abigail Adams

"These are the times that try men's souls," Thomas Paine wrote near the end of the turbulent, fear-filled year of 1776.

It was the soul of a woman, however, that defiantly withstood the weight of the trial — the miraculous fight for American independence — with five children at her hip.

Abigail Adams never flinched, never wavered.

Neither the crown then nor fellow citizens today can mistake her gamble on a bold new nation called the United States.

"We are no ways dispirited here. We possess a spirit that will not be conquered," Adams wrote to her husband, John, on Sept. 20, 1776, days after George Washington's colonial army was routed by the British in Brooklyn and Manhattan.

Adams was just 31 with five small children at her humble farmhouse, with her husband far from home for much of their marriage.

"No woman in the history of our nation contributed more or sacrificed more for our country than Abigail Adams," said Tom Koch, mayor of Quincy, Massachusetts, where Abigail lived most of her life, and a devoted scholar of Adams history.

She rests today within the Church of the Presidents, across from his office at Quincy City Hall.

He added, "She was a revolutionary in every sense of the word."

Adams watched the rebellion intensify two months later. She climbed a hill near the humble family farmhouse, which doubled as her husband's law office, and watched the Battle of Bunker Hill erupt across Boston Harbor with her 7-year-old son, John Quincy.

"The day, perhaps the decisive day, is come on which the fate of America depends," she wrote afterward. "My bursting heart must find vent at my pen."

She knew a difficult life lay ahead, yet never wavered.



#### From our Founder, Wilma Melville:

"As the Search Dog Foundation continues moving forward, ever-evolving our program and improving our campus to ensure the training of future generations of canine disaster search teams, we have not forgotten where it all began.



#### 168 is engraved in my heart.

On April 19, 1995, many of our lives were changed forever when a terrorist bomb ripped open the side of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, killing 168 and injuring many more. First responders from across the country answered the call to aid in rescue and recovery efforts, including me and my disaster search dog, Murphy.

While this tragedy marked the beginning of the Search Dog Foundation, it has always been not about our organization, but the lives lost and the many rescuers who worked tirelessly to find and help others in the aftermath.

After my deployment to Oklahoma City, I set a personal goal of seeing the Search Dog Foundation not only train, but certify 168 canine disaster search teams – one for each of the lives lost.



Because of that life-altering experience, I made a vow to myself and the nation that we would create the first nonprofit organization to produce highly -trained disaster search dogs for our country, providing them free-of-charge to their task forces and fire departments to help ensure that no survivors are left behind.

And boy, did we... together!

What started as a small group of volunteers, nearly as driven as the search dogs we trained, together we have created an organization that continues to lead the way for providing support and strengthening disaster response in this country.

Since that fateful day 25 years ago, SDF teams have responded to 196 deployments around the world, rescued hundreds of dogs from bad situations, and made a difference in countless lives.

Then, I was able to travel to the certification test in Phoenix, Arizona, earlier this year to see seven SDF-trained search teams pass their tests, completing my goal of creating 168 certified search teams.

Now, hear how the bombing in Oklahoma affected my life as well as my message for the handlers who certified in Phoenix and for all who have certified throughout our history."

### 18 May City of Hope - Lions Tribute Day


President Victor represented Pleasant Valley Lions at the City of Hope Lions Tribute Day.

#### 20 May 1927 Lindbergh Begins Transatlantic Flight

Departing from Roosevelt Field on Long Island, New York, just before 8 a.m. on May 20, Lindbergh would spend the next 33-and-a-half hours in the air before landing safely at Le Bourget Airdrome, Paris, at 10:22 p.m. local time on May 21, according to the Smithsonian National Air and Space Museum's website.

A sizable crowd in France was waiting for Lindbergh's arrival.

"The crowd surged on the Spirit of St. Louis, and Lindbergh, weary from his 33 1/2-hour, 3,600-mile journey, was cheered and lifted above their heads," noted the History Channel website.

The journey across the Atlantic was physically and mentally taxing.

Lindbergh did not sleep for the entire duration of the flight, and he estimated that he went more than two full days without sleeping.

"Lindbergh went so far as to buzz the surface of the ocean in the hope that the chilly sea spray would help keep him awake, but 24 hours into the journey, he became delirious from lack of rest," said the site.

Additionally, Lindbergh kept the windows to his plane open for the entire trip.

While keeping the windows open increased drag, Lindbergh hoped that the cold air would force him to stay awake for the duration of the flight.

During the flight, Lindbergh began hallucinating, seeing "fog islands" in the sea and describing "vaguely outlined forms, transparent, moving, riding weightless with me in the plane," said the History Channel. These apparitions, Lindbergh said, "spoke to him and offered words of wisdom for his journey."

President Calvin Coolidge arranged for his transport back to the United States (by boat, not by plane) and he received a ticker-tape parade in New York City and the Congressional Medal of Honor,.



# May - June Historical Events

• May 5, 1961 - Alan Shepard became the first American in space. He piloted the spacecraft *Freedom* 7 during a 15-minute 28-second suborbital flight that reached an altitude of 116 miles (186 kilometers) above the earth. Shepard's success occurred 23 days after the Russians had launched the first-ever human in space, cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin, during an era of intense technological competition between the Russians and Americans called the Space Race.



• May 6, 1937 - The German airship Hindenburg burst into flames at 7:20 p.m. as it neared the mooring mast at Lakehurst, New Jersey, following a trans-Atlantic voyage. Thirty six of the 97 passengers and crew were killed. The inferno was caught on film and also witnessed by a commentator who broke down amid the emotional impact and exclaimed, "Oh, the humanity!" The accident effectively ended commercial airship traffic.



• May 18, 1804 - Napoleon Bonaparte became Emperor of France, snatching the crown from the hands of Pope Pius VII during the actual coronation ceremony, and then crowning himself.



Reservation in southeastern Arizona. After a peace treaty had been broken by the U.S. Army in 1861, he waged war against settlers and soldiers, forcing them to withdraw from southern Arizona. In 1862, he became principal chief of the Apaches. He and 200 followers avoided capture by hiding in the Dragoon Mountains. In June of 1871, Army General George Crook assumed command in Arizona and managed to win the allegiance of many Apaches. Cochise then surrendered. He disappeared briefly in the spring of 1872, but returned and settled on the reservation where he died.



June 26, 1945 - Champion athlete Mildred "Babe" Didrikson (1911-1956) was born in Port Arthur, Texas. Nicknamed after baseball legend Babe Ruth, she won two gold medals at the 1932 Olympics, setting world records in the javelin throw and high hurdle. She then took up golf, winning the 1946 U.S. Women's Amateur Tournament. In 1947, she won 17 straight golf championships and became the first American winner of the British Ladies' Amateur Tournament. As a pro golfer, she won the U.S. Women's Open in 1950 and 1954. She also excelled in softball, baseball, swimming, figure skating, billiards, and even football. In 1950, she was named 'woman athlete of the first half of the 20th century' by the Associated Press. She died of cancer at age 45.

Why do men's clothes have buttons on the right while women's clothes have buttons on the left?

### **BECAUSE**

Why do ships and aircraft use 'mayday' as their call for help?

### **BECAUSE**

This comes from the French word m'aidez - meaning 'help me' - and is pronounced, approximately, 'mayday.'

### 3. WHY?

Why are zero scores in tennis called 'love'?

### **BECAUSE**

In France, where tennis became popular, the round zero on the scoreboard looked like an egg and was called 'l'oeuf,' which is French for 'the egg.' When tennis was introduced in the US, Americans (naturally), mispronounced it 'love.'

### 4. WHY?

Why do X's at the end of a letter signify kisses?

### **BECAUSE**

In the Middle Ages, when many people were unable to read or write, documents were often signed using an X. Kissing the X represented an oath to fulfill obligations specified in the document. The X and the kiss eventually became synonymous.

### 5. WHY?

Why is shifting responsibility to someone else called passing the buck'?

#### **BECAUSE**

In card games, it was once customary to pass an item, called a buck, from player to player to indicate whose turn it was to deal. If a player did not wish to assume the responsibility of dealing, he would 'pass the buck' to the next player.

### 6. WHY?

Why do people clink their glasses before drinking a toast?

### **BECAUSE**

In earlier times it used to be common for someone to try to kill an enemy by offering him a poisoned drink. To prove to a guest that a drink was safe, it became customary for a guest to pour a small amount of his drink into the glass of the host. Both men would drink it simultaneously. When a guest trusted his host, he would only touch or clink the host's glass with his own.

### 7.. WHY?

Why are people in the public eye said to be 'in the limelight'?

### **BECAUSE**

Invented in 1825, limelight was used in lighthouses and theatres by burning a cylinder of lime which produced a brilliant light. In the theatre, a performer 'in the limelight' was the Centre of attention.

### 8. WHY?

Why is someone who is feeling great 'on cloud nine'?

### **BECAUSE**

Types of clouds are numbered according to the altitudes they attain, with nine being the highest cloud. If someone is said to be on cloud nine, that person is floating well above worldly cares.

### 9. WHY?

In golf, where did the term 'Caddie' come from?

### **BECAUSE**

When Mary Queen of Scots went to France as a young girl, Louis, King of France, learned that she loved the Scots game 'golf.' He had the first course outside of Scotland built for her enjoyment. To make sure she was properly chaperoned (and guarded) while she played, Louis hired cadets from a military school to accompany her.
